WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR THE SICK

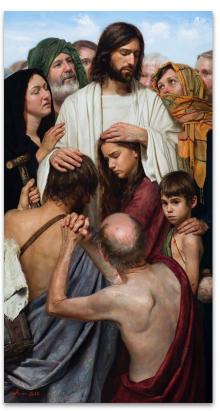
"And wherever HE went, into villages or cities, they laid the sick in marketplaces and begged Him that they might touch even the fringe of His cloak; and all who touched it were healed." (Mark 6:56)

Jesus showed his love for the sick by visiting them, by touching them, by forgiving them and healing them. He encourages us to recognize Him in our sick brothers and sisters.

In 1992, Pope John Paul II instituted the WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR THE SICK, to encourage people to pray for those who suffer from illness, and their caregivers. The Pope had been diagnosed with Parkinson's a year before and it is considered that his own illness was impetus for the designation of this day. Pope Benedict XVI declared his decision to resign from his post as the Pope on this day in 2013. He cited his failing health as the reason.

February 11, the established day, is also the Catholic feast of Our Lady of Lourdes. This title was given to Mary in honor of the apparitions that were to have been seen in and around Lourdes, France by a young girl named Bernadette Soubirous, now St. Bernadette.

People around the world take the time to pray for the sick and for those who work very hard to alleviate the sufferings of the sick.

When sickness is mistaken for punishment: Lord, be close to give your comfort

When it's difficult to sleep: Lord, be close to give your comfort

When there's loss of appetite: Lord, be close to give your comfort

When nobody seems to understand: Lord, be close to give your comfort

When medication seems to make things worse: Lord, be close to give your comfort.

THE ALARM CLOCK ALLELUIA

As your alarm goes off, repeat the psalm: "This is the day the Lord has made. Let us rejoice and be glad." Commit to living in gratitude for the day.





TELEPHONE THANKSGIVING

Let your telephone remind you of life's blessings. Every time it rings, recall something good in your life and say a brief prayer of thanks. If it's been "one of those days" say thanks anyway because sometimes we learn the most from life's challenges.

LUNCHTIME COMMUNION

For at least one minute, eat slowly and deliberately. Notice the taste and texture of each bite---the crunch of celery, the chewiness of whole wheat bread, the smooth sweetness of ice cream---and give thanks for the incredible abundance of food in this country. Ask for blessings on all those who provide food and those who are hungry.





THE GAS PUMP MINUTE

As you pump gas, visualize God's spirit flowing into you, filling you with enough holy energy to do God's will for the rest of the day. What is that will? In every religion, it's the same: We are called to love one another.

GRACE BEFORE MEALS

Marc and his family say grace before meals even if they're at a restaurant. "We think it's important to keep God first, and giving thanks three times a day reminds us of that."





THE STOPLIGHT ACT OF CONTRITION

Instead of giving in to impatience and frustration, the next time you are stopped at a red light, use the moment to think about your day. Have you been rude, gotten angry, or in any other way not lived up to the best that is in you? Before you step on the gas again, say a prayerful "I'm sorry."

NIGHTTIME TAPS

Relax into sleep with the TAPS prayer. Offer <u>Thanksgiving</u> for the day's blessings; show <u>Adoration</u> for the Creator, <u>Petition</u> for your needs and those of your loved ones and express <u>Sorrow</u> if in any way you hurt another. Sleep well.

LENTEN ALERT

Just as living out our Baptism brings us the happiness of knowing our path to our Loving God, Lent is designed to bring us closer to Him who created us. We follow Jesus' way through passion and death to Resurrection. Prayer, fasting and almsgiving are the guideposts to help us. With faith, trust and gratitude we endeavor to get our hearts ready to contemplate the mysteries of Jesus' death and resurrection. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, March 1, 2017.
